BACHELOR OF ARTS IN ENGLISH – EDUCATION CONCENTRATION

Purpose Statement: This degree equips students with a wide range of skills that focus on the teaching of English, including the ability to research and critically consider various pedagogical methods; to read with sensitivity and sophistication; and to clearly express insights in both oral and written discourse. The Education Concentration primarily prepares students for careers as educators on the secondary level, but also provides a solid foundation in literature, writing, and pedagogy that can be applied to careers in academia, publishing, editing, marketing, journalism, and many others.

Recommended Schedule

The following is a sample schedule that would result in a student accumulating enough credit hours to earn a B.A. degree in English with an Education concentration. It is calibrated for a theoretical student who takes courses face-to-face during the traditional academic year, does not bring in any transfer credit, and has not tested into higher level courses. The degree map will need to be adjusted for students who have previous college credit or who “test out” of introductory courses, and it does account for the possibility of taking classes online or during the summer term.
