Purpose Statement: This degree equips students with a wide range of transferable skills, including the ability to think critically; to write and conduct research in various rhetorical situations; to read with sensitivity and sophistication; and to clearly express insights in both oral and written discourse. The Literature Concentration prepares students for careers in publishing, editing, writing, teaching, advertising, law, journalism, communications, marketing, and many other areas; and it provides a strong foundation for students who wish to pursue graduate school.

Recommended Schedule

The following is a sample schedule that would result in a student accumulating enough credit hours to earn a B.A. degree in English with a Literature concentration. It is calibrated for a theoretical student who takes courses face-to-face during the traditional academic year, does not bring in any transfer credit, and has not tested into higher level courses. The degree map will need to be adjusted for students who have previous college credit or who “test out” of introductory courses, and for students who choose to take classes online or during the summer term.
